

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MEET OUR CLINICIANS



Dr Gordon Brock - Concert Bands

Dr. Gordon R. Brock is Professor Emeritus and former Director of Bands at the University of North Florida's School of Music Flagship Program in Jacksonville, Florida, where he conducted the Wind Symphony, instructed courses in conducting and woodwind performance, coordinated the graduate instrumental conducting program and instituted the highly regarded annual UNF Conducting Symposium. Under Dr. Brock's leadership as chair (2002-12), the School of Music was awarded the elite flagship designation and emerged as a program of prominence recognized throughout the region for its renowned faculty, dedication to student learning and community engagement. Dr. Brock's career as a music educator encompassed elementary through university levels. He has been acknowledged as a Distinguished Alumnus of Dickinson State University (2006) and as the UNF Gerson Yessin Professor (2010-12). He has served as a guest conductor and clinician throughout the United States, Canada, Japan and Israel, and was honoured with guest conducting appearances with both the United States Army Field Band and Chorus, and the

President's Own United States Marine Band. A chapter contributor to the GIA publication, The Art of Interpretation of Band Music, Dr. Brock has also served as a Research Associate and author for the GIA instrumental music education series Teaching Music through Performance in Band, a series that functions as a primary text in more than 300 universities in the United States and 20 countries.



Mark DeJong - Jazz Bands

Mark DeJong is a saxophonist, composer, and bandleader, and teaches at the Mount Royal University Conservatory. He holds degrees in saxophone performance from the University of Calgary, (BMus) and jazz performance from Rutgers University (MMus). Active as a performer and clinician throughout North America, Mark has numerous recording credits and appearances at festivals across the country. He is the co-leader of Calgary' acclaimed Redline Trio, and was recently featured as a soloist with Sarah Slean and the Vancouver Symphony, Calgary Philharmonic and the Saskatoon Jazz Orchestra, Winnipeg Jazz Orchestra, as well as toured with Canada's legendary Shuffle Demons in Panama and Cuba. He appeared as a featured artist at the World Expo in Shanghai China, as well as the Blue Note (NYC). Over the course of his career, he has shared the stage with such luminaries as Ray Charles, Gil Goldstein, Dee Daniels, Lenny Pickett, Kenny Wheeler, Brad Turner, Carol Welsman, Campbell

Dr Jennifer Lang - Choral

Dr. Jennifer Lang is an Associate Professor of Music Education, Director of Choral Activities, and the Acting Vice-Dean Academic in the College of Arts & Science at the University of Saskatchewan. She is a co-lead for the University of Saskatchewan's Signature Area in Health & Wellness and serves as the Pillar Lead for Music, Arts, and Wellbeing. She is the organizer of the Department of Music's Music Education in Action Series, the founder and organizer of the uSing uSask Choral Festival, the conductor of the Greystone Singers and the Founder and Artistic Director of Aurora Voce. Jennifer has been awarded the USSU Teaching Award (2020) and the Publicly Engaged Scholar Award for Research, Scholarly, and Artistic Work in the College of Arts & Science (2023). Her choirs regularly perform with the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra and other celebrated ensembles and composers. Dr. Lang has adjudicated most recently at the Saskatchewan Music Festival in Saskaton and Regina in 2023; the Manitoba ChoralFest in 2022; Cantando Festival 2019 in Alberta; ChorFest 2019 in

Saskatchewan; the Moose Jaw Band and Choral Festival 2019; ChoralFest North 2018 in Alberta; 2017 Cantando Sun Peaks Festival in British Columbia; and ChorFest 2016 in Saskatchewan. Jennifer's research examines engagement and agency in music education programs, including informal music learning in a variety of educational contexts, intergenerational singing programs, and language and music development for Newcomer Youth to Canada for which she holds several research grants. Jennifer is also active as a conductor, choral adjudicator, clinician and conference presenter. Her forthcoming edited book, Music and wellbeing in education and community contexts, presents a variety of contributed chapters exploring the intersections of music education and wellbeing. Before moving to the province of Saskatchewan, Jennifer taught high school music in Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario.



Dawn McLean-Belyak - Concert Bands

Dawn McLean Belyk is currently the Bass Trombonist with the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra, the Saskatoon Jazz Orchestra, the Saskatoon Symphony Low Brass Ensemble, and the Saskatchewan Brass Quintet. She also teaches Low Brass at the University of Saskatchewan, both undergrad and grad students and is a sessional lecturer in Music Education. Active as a Low Brass Specialist, she has a growing studio at home, and teaches clinics throughout the province. Dawn has adjudicated bands in Alberta and Saskatchewan, and received the Dwaine Nelson Award for Teaching Excellence at the U of S in 2006, the Saskatoon Preschool Foundation Champion of Children Award in 2009, the Saskatchewan Band Association Distinguished Band Director Award in 2013, and in 2022 received the Saskatchewan Music Educators Association Outstanding Achievement Award.



Dean McNeil - Jazz Bands

Trumpet player/composer Dean McNeill is Head of the University of Saskatchewan Department of Music where he teaches jazz and classical performance courses. Dean has received the USASK Department of Music's Dwaine Nelson Teaching Award, USASK Teaching Excellence Award, Saskatchewan Jazz Festival's Special Recognition Award, Saskatchewan Choral Federation's Outstanding Administrator's Award, Downbeat Magazine arranger's award, and, the Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal (Saskatchewan). Dean has been nominated for a SK Arts and Learning Award and he was a member of the Saskatoon Symphony for 23 years. Dean is currently Artistic Director of the Saskatoon Jazz Orchestra. He has been involved in the creation of over 16 CDs most notably six USASK Jazz Ensemble 'Bumper Crop' CDs (as conductor), the Western Canadian Music Awards-nominated CDs The Saskatchewan Suite: The Story of Us (performer) and The Complete

Rebirth Of The Cool (performer). In 2012 Dean was soloist on the Edmonton Winds CD project O Music that won a Western Canadian Music Award (classical composition of the year). Dean has

composed and arranged music for symphony orchestra, wind ensemble, large and small brass ensembles, jazz combo, and large jazz ensemble. Crediting much of his success to diligence and strong musical role models, Dean is honoured to have shared the professional concert stage with the likes of Jon Ballantyne, Tommy Banks, David Braid, Dee Daniels, Phil Dwyer, Hugh Fraser, Mark Fewer, Guy Few, Wycliffe Gordon, Kelly Jefferson, Ingrid Jensen, Michael Kaeshammer, Alastair Kay, Bob Mintzer, PJ Perry, Maria Schneider, Denzal Sinclaire, and Brad Turner among others. Dr Melissa Morgan - Choral

Dr. Melissa Morgan is a choral conductor, educator, speaker, and vocalist from Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada. She is the Department Head of Music and Director of Choral Activities in the department of Media, Arts, and Performance at the University of Regina. Her responsibilities include conducting the auditioned, Chamber Singers, and the non-auditioned Concert Choir in addition to teaching courses in

choral conducting, and serving on several university committees. In fall of 2022, Dr. Morgan became the music director of the Campion College Musica Sacra music series. An active conductor, she is frequently asked to serve as a clinician, adjudicator, and guest conductor with choirs throughout North America.

Scholarly contributions of Dr. Morgan have appeared in include The Choral Journal, and the Canadian Music Educators Association Journal. Her publications include articles in Teaching Music Through Performance in Choir, Vol. 5, published by GIA Publications Inc. Currently, Dr. Morgan is focussing her writing efforts on an Open Educational Resource (OER) textbook about singing for emerging vocalist and actors. Dr. Morgan is also writing contributions for a new book that focuses on women composers to be published by GIA Publications Inc.

Dr. Morgan holds a Doctorate of Music Performance in Choral Conducting from the University of Toronto, a Master of Music Performance in Choral Conducting from the University of Western Ontario, a Bachelor of Arts and a Bachelor of Music Education from the University of Regina. She is also an Associate of the Toronto Royal Conservatory of Music (ARCT) in piano, voice, and flute.



Stella Salido-Porter - Strings

Born and raised in Saskatchewan, Stella Salido Porter has performed on stages throughout North America. Her post secondary education began by earning a certificate of Professional Training in Musical Theatre from the American Musical and Dramatic Academy in New York City. Stella continued her studies by completing both a Bachelor and Master of Music Degrees in vocal performance studies from the University of Regina.

Although singing is her forte, Stella started her musical training with the violin. She has studied in Regina at the Conservatory of Music since she was 5 years old performing with the Moose Jaw Youth String Orchestra and has competed in Regina and Moose Jaw Music Festivals through the years. Stella has studied with violinist/ violist, Hilary Borton of the Regina Symphony Orchestra and violinist, conductor and teacher, Dr. Howard Leyton-Brown. At the age of 12, she became a member of the

South Saskatchewan Youth Orchestra performing all over Western Canada. She has also participated in the Banff Centre of Fine Arts taking various violin masterclasses and workshops.

Stella currently resides in Moose Jaw with her husband, Derek and two sons, Jaylon and Micah. She maintains an active career in performance, runs a busy private studio teaching vocal performance, violin, and flute. Stella also serves as a Musical Theatre voice instructor for the Doris Sitter School of Dance and a band assistant for the Holy Trinity Elementary Band program. Stella is thrilled to be invited back to participate in the Moose Jaw Band and Choral Festival.



Brian Uzick - Concert Bands

Brian Uzick grew up in Melville, Saskatchewan where he learned to play bass clarinet and clarinet in school band and saxophone in the jazz band. He attended University of Saskatchewan and received a Bachelor of Music in Music Education. He began teaching band and choir at in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. During this time, he attended the University of British Columbia and received a diploma in Counselling Psychology. He moved to Calgary, Alberta where he taught at Western Canada High School from 1991-2006 and was the Fine Arts Curriculum Leader. For 12 years, Brian taught grade 7-12 concert band, jazz band and was musical

director for musical productions at Strathcona-Tweedsmuir School. He was the Fine Arts Curriculum Leader for 9 years. The Senior Band grew in numbers from 15 to 70 members and toured to California, Texas, Illinois, Austria, Russia and Italy. He also became certified to teach the Middle and Senior International Baccalaureate programs. He retired from Strathcona-Tweedsmuir School in June of 2018 but remains very busy. He continues to teach clinics, guest conduct, plan workshops, mentor and adjudicate throughout Western Canada.

In Memoriam

The Moose Jaw Band and Choral Festival is honoured to be able to remember music educators who have passed, but not before leaving a legacy of making a difference in music education in the province. We dedicate our venues to the memories of the following:



Joan Netter - Zion United Church

Joan was born on August 12th, 1942, in Fortuna, CA to Ruth and Johannes Larsen and lived out her childhood and young life in Ferndale, CA. An avid musician and vocalist, she was heavily involved in music her entire life. At Ferndale Union High School, she was Drum Major for the Marching Band, Pep band Leader, Honour Band member and part of the Chorus group.

She and her husband Frank moved to Scandia, Alberta, Canada in 1968 and then to Kindersley, Saskatchewan in 1972, where Joan became an integral part of the Christian and Musical community. She was a Choir Director for the church, which led to Director of the Community Choir and eventually she was the President of the Saskatchewan Choral Federation, all positions that she took a great deal of pride in.

Her contribution to music education, as a result of her involvement with the Saskatchewan Choral Federation was invaluable and is appreciated.



Sharon Penner - Mae Wilson Theatre

Although not a music educator, Sharon Penner spent numerous years volunteering with a number of community organizations in addition to serving as Executive Director of the National Music Festival of Canada for 10 years.

The Moose Jaw Music Festival and the Moose Jaw Band and Choral Festival were especially close to her heart. For decades Sharon was the friendly voice on the end of the phone helping to organize the schedule, night shows, and clinicians. All this was done prior to, and leading up to, the IT changeover to emails and websites. Even after officially stepping back from the festival committee, she remained a valuable resource for years as committee members gradually became comfortable in their new positions.

Sharon was recognized for her many years of community service in 2010 when she was chosen as Moose Jaw's Citizen of the Year.

Angela Gillis - Peacock Centennial Auditorium



Born into a family of music enthusiasts, Angela began piano in elementary school and voice and French horn in junior high school. Her active musical life continued through high school singing in the Moberly High School Choir and playing in the Concert Band and the Marching Band. Angela pursued post-secondary musical studies and earned a Bachelor of Music in Music Education (1988) at Baker University, Baldwin City, Kansas, and a Master of Music in Music Education (1994) at the University of Missouri in Columbia. Angela was certified to teach in Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, and Saskatchewan. Angela continued to learn and to improve as a teacher and was certified in Kodaly I and Orff I levels. She was a stalwart in professional organizations in the USA and in Canada making a difference in educational learning. Angela always strove to provide creative opportunities for her students and orchestrated innovative and collaborative performances and displays at all the schools in which she taught. She was determined that every child in her class

experience joy in music making. She was a passionate advocate for the child-centred, diverse, and multi-cultural process as developed by German composer and music educator Carl Orff (1895-1982). Her ongoing energy and dedication to her students and colleagues, particularly the Saskatchewan Orff Chapter, have been an inspiration and treasured gift. Angela began her teaching career in Atlanta, Missouri (band, choral, and general music) and then relocated to Lawton, Oklahoma to become a powerhouse at Hugh Bish Elementary. In 2000 she was awarded "Champion for Children" from the Lawton Public Schools. For five years, Angela also taught music appreciation and popular music night classes at Cameron University in Lawton. She continued her teaching career in Canada with the Saskatoon Public Schools at Marion M. Graham Collegiate (in 2003) and later at several elementary schools: Caroline Robins, Alvin Buckwold, Holliston, Howard Coad, and most recently at Ernest Lindner. She was an instructor for the University of Saskatchewan Community Music Education Program and Extension Services for Seniors. Over a

span of twenty years, she also taught elementary music education classroom instruments courses in the Department of Music at the University of Saskatchewan.



Colin Grunert - St Aidan Anglican Church - Jazz Band

Colin Grunert was a band director in Saskatchewan for 29 years. Graduating from Minot State University in 1980, he subsequently took a position in Long Lake School Division for three years, then moved to Estevan. Through the years, he taught band from grade 6-12 until his death in 2009. His bands included concert band, jazz band, marching band, drum line, pep bands at sporting events, and pit bands for musical productions. The ensembles he conducted received recognition locally, provincially, nationally, and internationally. Colin personally received awards including the first recipient of Musicfest Canada's Keith Mann Award, Saskatchewan Band Association's Distinguished Band Director, and the Paul Harris Fellow by the Estevan Rotary Club for Community Service.

One of his pet projects was Saskatchewan Band Association's Kenosee Summer Band Camp, the only residential summer band camp in Saskatchewan. Colin's hobbies outside of band and community included construction work and

watching his children in their various activities. He was especially proud of his family, his wife, Stacy and children, Patrick(Laura), Sheena(Nathan), Alyssa(Evan) and Matthew(Brooke).

The family is delighted that the Moose Jaw Band and Choral Festival is honouring him in this way.

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
